Dear Guild Members,

As we step into 2025, I want to take a moment to reflect on the incredible progress we've made together over the past year. Thanks to your hard work, dedication, and passion, our Guild has become stronger, more vibrant, and more engaged in the community.

Here are some key highlights from 2024 that we can all be proud of:

• Membership Growth: We've seen our statewide membership grow at a steady clip. We've brought in new faces, including younger members, women, and people from different backgrounds, which has enriched our community. One of the single-largest sources for member growth has been through the creation of the Colorado Springs "Pikes Peak" subchapter this past May – under the leadership of Jim Barry, and assisted by Bill Schlittler and Joe Lenhoff, this group has grown to include over 50 members.

• Education and Meeting Presentations: Our educational presentations were outstanding, and we hosted individual and group mentoring sessions that helped elevate the skills of many of our members. Some of the highlights from the meetings this last year included: Kagen Sound (a world-class puzzle maker), our own David Howard who presented his production techniques for mass-producing beautiful "stained-glass" cutting boards, and Regan Zubiate (a student of Laura Kishimoto), who showcased her beautiful "Wood Leaf" chair. Kevin and I also threw down the gauntlet for a friendly competition amongst members, with the "Rust Bucket" Challenge – where members were tasked with restoring a rusty, old, beat-up tool to its former glory. Jim Barry and Phil Weathers reorganized our library and added valuable resources, and our monthly newsletter from Joe kept everyone informed and connected.

• Social Connection: Our guild thrives because of the relationships we've built. This past year saw great shop tours, sponsor field trips, and our combined FRW / CWG summer BBQ and holiday parties were quite lively with a tremendous turnout. These events were not only fun, but they also allowed us to connect and learn from one another.

• Community Service: We made a real difference in the community. We produced 40 urns for veterans' unclaimed remains, built over 400 toys through our partnership with the "International Brotherhood of Bearded Santas" for children in need, and the Pikes Peak Chapter, headed up by Mike Hughes, contributed over 350 toys last year, with another 125 this year to the great "Ronald McDonald House" organization. Members also contributed their time teaching woodworking at organizations like the Colorado Stem Academy, The Masters Apprentice, and the Denver Tool Library. Our collaboration with other guilds and makerspaces has also helped us reach new communities and foster creativity.

• Guild Infrastructure: Our organizational structure has been put on much firmer ground this year. Our Treasurer Larry Christensen helped us obtain our 501(c)(3) status, which opens up new funding opportunities and allows us to continue expanding our reach. Our illustrious former president Dennis Edmonds, along with Larry and the rest of the board persevered in making much-needed changes to our bylaws and governing documents – the last major revision of these documents was long overdue, dating back to 2016.

Looking ahead, we have the momentum to accomplish even more in 2025. Our goals remain focused on membership growth, providing educational opportunities, strengthening social connections, contributing to our community, and ensuring a sustainable future for the Guild. In the coming year, let's continue to build on the incredible foundation we've laid. We'll focus on:

- Growing our statewide membership to 250 and beyond.
- Expanding our educational offerings and mentoring opportunities.
- Continuing our community service projects and exploring new ways to give back.
- Strengthening our internal structure and communications to ensure we're positioned for long-term success.

Together, we will make 2025 a year of growth, creativity, and meaningful connections. Thank you for all your contributions to the Guild, and I look forward to working with each of you to build on our successes.

February 2025 Meeting

On February 18th, <u>Carlos D. Flores</u>, of <u>Una Raiz Woodworks</u>, will present on "Hand Tools & Culture in Fine Woodworking'".

- Carlos (he/him/his) is a woodworker, musician, and storyteller, transforming trees into expressive but functional pieces of furniture and home goods. His work is usually identifiable by fine lines, a bold, sweeping sense of motion, and rich textures. While his designs often require the use of more innovative techniques, the heart of his woodworking lies deeply in the almost exclusive use of hand tools. Born in Borikén (Puerto Rico), he considers it a sacred duty to honor his mixed Afro-Taino-Spanish ancestry in his work, especially in response to the generally Eurocentric perspective that is most often offered within the fine woodworking community.
- After pursuing a career in film and graphic design for over ten years, Carlos decided to start over, desiring a life of more tangible value and authenticity. He studied at the Fine Woodworking Program at Red Rocks Community College. He started his company, Una Raíz Woodworks, in 2023, and built a small shop in which to do his work, hand tools first. CWG Pikes Peak Chapter News

We had about 20 folks in attendance including a visit from the Guild's new President, Bill Bixby, and Guild Treasurer, Larry Christianson.

Show & Tell: Four members brought items:

• Laura Turner brought some inlays made on her CNC machine. She also described a technique for applying acrylic paint that prevents the color from bleeding into adjacent areas. Note Laura is hosting a tour of her CNC setup this Saturday (see below)



• Bruce Dellinger brought a work-in-progress Mandola and discussed a variety of techniques he uses including a variety of specially shaped scrapers, and inlay methods



• Richard House brought a bow saw he made from bird's eye maple using parts from a Grammercy kit.



• Jim Barry brought a replica of a table from the Molly Brown House in Denver made from Jatoba (aka Brazilian Cherry). The table's designed to be easily taken apart for moving, with hinged legs and a locking disc to hold it together.



Tool Review Session (kudos to Dan Sullivan for thinking this up)

Joe Lenhoff showed a battery adapter that allows DeWalt batteries to be used in other cordless hand power tools (e.g. Craftsman). They are available for about \$15 on Amazon and for other brands of cordless tools.



Jim Barry reviewed the new Woodpecker Dado Nut for Sawstop Table Saws. It is threaded all the way through the flange and nut. This is very useful when using a full dado set when there are few available threads for the nut. Ben Myers reported that this was Woodpecker's best-selling item last year. Jim also showed the Jessem Clear-Cut Precision Stock Guides for Table Saws. Mounting it on a wooden base with Magswitches allows it to be easily attached and removed from the table saw fence.



Bill Schlittler demonstrated some ways to use his favorite marking tool – a simple scribe, paired with a caliper.



Bruce Dellinger demonstrated use of the ACCU-BURR tool for putting a burr on a card scraper. It has 3 v-notches at 5, 10 and 15 degrees for successively coarser burrs.
